The Government now plans to add the full complement of 313 extra officers by 2020, to be delivered with an additional \$16 million revealed in last week's Budget.

The blowout was attributed to longer training programs being needed for SA recruits, after the Government abolished overseas recruitments for the jobs.

The Government in 2010 pledged to strengthen the police workforce by 2014.

Mr Weatherill restated the promise in the 2014 election, extending the time frame to mid-2018 and contributed \$34 million towards the Recruit 313 strategy.

Mr Weatherill told the Advertiser the committment would

be maintained, "this is despite the fact we already have the highest number of police per capita of any state".

Police Minister Peter Malinauskas yesterday said the new time frame of 2020 would be reached.

"The State Government commitment to recruit 313 staff will be honoured and the reason why we've extended it is

to ensure we give South Australians every opportunity to work in workforce," Mr Malinauskas said. "The police commissioner advised me we were on track to achieve the recruitment target of 2018, but in order to

achieve the political timeline we would have had to recruit

Police Commissioner Grant Stevens said additional time was needed for a more extensive training process for South Australians.




